1. IMAGINARY TRAVEL: ENHANCING DRAMATIC ROLE PLAY THROUGH SOUND

Description and Objectives:

In this experience, Wolf Trap Teaching Artists Valerie Bayne Carroll and Michele Valeri demonstrate how to travel into a story and experience it on a new level using pictures, sound effects, and music.

Through imaginary travel, children engage in abstract thinking and problem solving.

3. I HAVE A BOX: EXPLORING SETTING AND CHARACTERIZATION

Developed by Katherine Lyons

Description and Objectives:

In this experience, Wolf Trap Teaching Artist Katherine Lyons demonstrates the use of gestures to represent real objects and introduce characters of a story.

This experience encourages children to use gesture to represent real objects and to visualize and create characters of the story through movement and sound.

4. COFFEE CAN THEATER: TUTORIAL

Developed by Melissa Richardson

Description and Objectives:

In this experience, Wolf Trap Teaching Artist Melissa Richardson demonstrates how to create a coffee can theater experience using manipulatives found around the house or classroom.

Coffee can theater is a strategy for sharing stories in which the teller uses small props to stand in for characters and elements of setting. Children can then retell and sequence the story in a hands-on way. Coffee can theater can also be used to create original class stories.

5. TEACHER IN ROLE: TRANSITIONING IN AND OUT OF CHARACTER

Developed by Jeanne Wall

Description and Objectives:

In this experience, Wolf Trap Teaching Artist Jeanne Wall demonstrates how an educator can transition in and out of character for dramatic play.

Teacher in role is an easy technique that allows the teacher to incorporate dramatic play and to lead the class from inside the dramatic play. In this example, the teacher introduces a story or experience with a puppet before then taking on the puppet's character through teacher in role.
